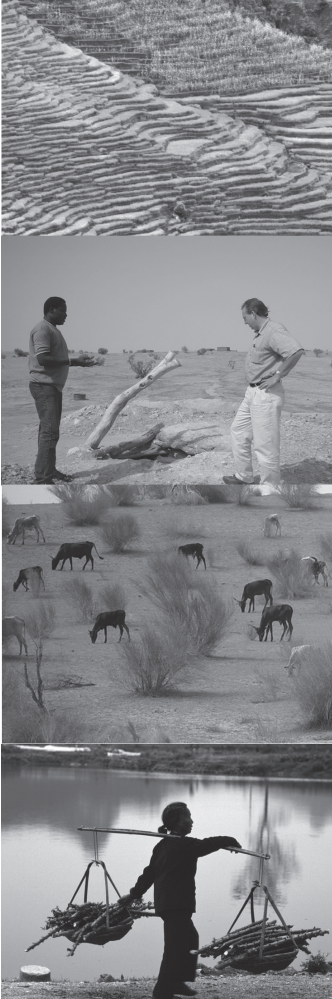

RD 823 - Community-Based Natural Resource Management in Developing Countries

This course examines the prospects for community-based natural resource management (CBNRM) in rural areas of developing countries. It focuses mainly on the roles of property rights, collective action, and the quality of local governance in promoting productivity, conservation, and equitable distribution of benefits from natural resource management. Throughout the course there will be an emphasis on understanding how institutional arrangements governing natural resource management operate in the context of given cultural, economic, legal, policy and biophysical conditions.
