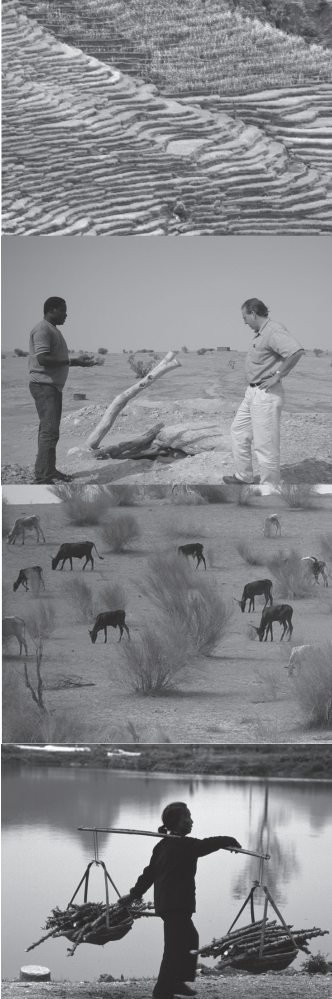

FULBRIGHT-HAYS FACULTY RESEARCH ABROAD FELLOWSHIP

Fulbright-Hays Faculty Research Abroad Fellowship Program offers opportunities to faculty of Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs) to engage in research abroad in modern foreign languages and area studies. The application deadline is **October 30, 2007**. As part of the application process, faculty submit individual applications to the IHE.

The IHE then officially submits all eligible individual faculty applications with its grant application to the Department. The estimated range of fellowship awards is \$20,000-\$100,000; the estimated average size is \$60,000; the estimated number is 25. NSF GRADUATE RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP

The National Science Foundation aims to ensure the vitality of the human resource base of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics in the United States and to reinforce its diversity by offering approximately 1,100 graduate fellowships in this competition. The Graduate Research Fellowship Program provides three years of support for graduate study leading to research-based master's or doctoral degrees and is intended for students who are in the early stages of their graduate study. The Graduate Research Fellowship Program (GRFP) invests in graduate education for a cadre of diverse individuals who demonstrate their potential to successfully complete graduate degree programs in disciplines relevant to the mission of the National Science Foundation. EPA FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITY FOR GRADUATE STUDY

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), as part of its Science to Achieve Results (STAR) program, is offering Graduate Fellowships for masters and doctoral level students in environmental fields of study.

Master's level students may receive support for a maximum of two years. Doctoral students may be supported for a maximum of three years, usable over a period of four years. GLOBAL DRUM PROJECT FEATURING MICKEY HART, ZAKIR HUSSAIN, SIKIRU ADEPOJU & GIOVANNI HIDALGO

The "Global Drum Project" 2007 Tour reunites Grateful Dead percussion heavyweight Mickey Hart with his longtime friend and collaborator, tabla master Zakir Hussain, along with talking drum ace Sikiru Adepoju and the formidable conguero Giovanni Hidalgo. "Planet Drum" was released in 1991 and went on to earn the first-ever Grammy in the World Music category. "This is a deep drumming groove. We're taking the archaic rhythm worlds into outer space. Global Drum Project explores rhythm and noise; it's a sound yoga of processed acoustic percussion headed straight for the trance zone that becomes a dance of ancient and modern worlds. Deep drumming is a skeleton key into these realms." - Mickey Hart

ANNOUNCEMENTS *continued***STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS:****ETHICS AND HISTORY OF DEVELOPMENT AND HEALTH CARE IN COSTA RICA (11 CREDITS)****Summer 2008, June 8 - August 1**

This program examines the health care system in Costa Rica, a developing nation that has in many ways been successful in providing health care and other services. We will look historically and culturally at how its health care system came to be, and how it operates within the present political and social milieu. We will also examine from an ethical point of view the dilemmas that arise in providing health care effectively, efficiently and fairly, with limited resources.

This is one, integrated class for which students will receive three 400-level credits of History and four 400-level credits of Philosophy. Students will also take Spanish language classes appropriate to their level, for which they will receive four MSU Spanish language credits. They will live with Spanish-speaking Costa Rican families within walking distance of our classrooms. There will also be the occasional visit to the rainforest, beach or volcano.

WOMEN'S STUDIES IN LONDON

In July and early-August, 2008, the Michigan State University Women's Studies Program in London offers the unique opportunity to study the lives of British women. London is a perfect setting for cross-cultural and cross-disciplinary investigation into British notions of gender, feminist movements, and feminist theories and perspectives. British women have made vital contributions to women's progress and have had intellectual, social, and political links to the United States since the 17th century.

Classroom discussion and readings are guided by such questions as: What influences have constructed notions of gender, race, class, ethnicity and sexuality had on British women's lives? What are British feminisms? By focusing on an overview of the ideas and history of the British women's movement, and on an overview of selected British women writers, we hope to come to some answers to these questions and to raise others as well.

Discussions and readings will be enhanced by contacts with women's organizations and trips to the Women's Library,

London's premiere archive of British women's activism. We will go on walking tours of London's great sights and of 'Women's London', to plays, art museums, and on trips to Stonehenge, Oxford and Leeds Castle. Along the way, we will compare U.S. notions of gender with England's and examine ways in which culture is influenced by legendary and ordinary women.
