International Health, NUR 402

Professor Connie Currier, on-line course

This course will provide a general understanding of factors/dynamics that affect the health of human populations and efforts to improve it. Water and Environment in African History, HST 484

Professor Wapu Mulwafu

M & W 3:00pm - 4:20pm, 214 Berkey Hall

This course seeks to expose students to debates on the relationship between human beings and the environment on the African continent. Emphasis will be placed on the relationships between state policies, local knowledge systems and environmental changes in a historical perspective. In addition to reading recent historical works on the linked social and environmental processes which have shaped Africa's past, a variety of interdisciplinary readings will be used to examine the diverse interpretive challenges which such an historical undertaking presents. This course begins with an introduction to trends in current methodological and theoretical approaches to writing environmental history. We then explore how scholars have begun unraveling dominant historical understandings of African landscapes, cultures and natural resources. The course will also focus on historical perspectives of land and water, and of challenges which have attended the use and management of such natural resources.

Social Theories of Public Communication, ADV 892

This course will explore several fundamental and recurring problems in the history, theory, and practice of public communication. Topics covered will include the following: roles of the mass media in forming publics; origins of the idea of the public in the Enlightenment and early 19th Century; theories of mass communication and public deliberation; problems of minority representation; roles of artistic and cultural expression in public communication; influences of political and economic power on communication ethics. Required readings will cover a range of academic interests:

mass communications, sociology, history, moral philosophy, cultural studies, and political science.
