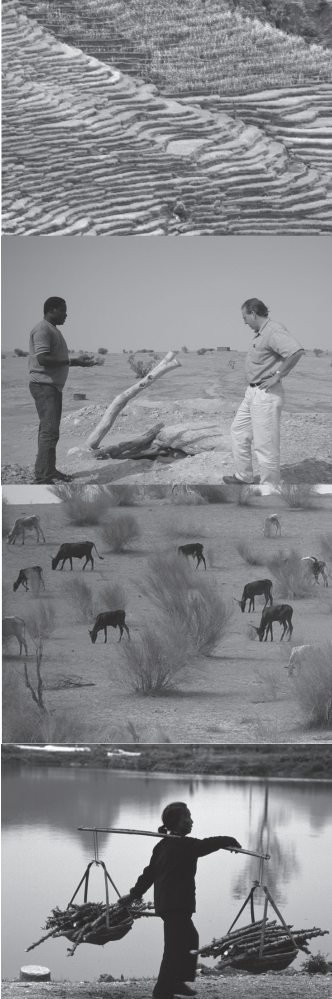

African Philosophy: PHL 351

John Otieno Ouko, T and Th 3:00 - 4:20, 120 Berkey Hall

Marxist Philosophy and the Africana World: PHL 491/PHL 890

John H. McClendon III, T 4:10-7:00, 1 Morrill Hall, 3 credits.
 The fact that Marxist philosophy emerged from the European context has stimulated dialogue and debate about its applicability to the Africana world. This course addresses how various people of African descent have philosophically responded to the question of whether Marxism can serve as a viable philosophy of liberation. The class will follow a lecture discussion format with particular attention given to extensive discussions based on the readings of Kwame Nkrumah, C.L.R. James, Claudia Jones, Eugene C. Holmes, Angela Davis, Cedric J. Robinson, and Cornel West.

African Historiography: HST 830

Dr. Peter Limb, T 7:10pm - 10:00pm, 314 Morrill Hall
 This graduate seminar course is about trends and debates in African history writing and in the study of history writing about Africa. It explores the origins and features of African historiography, its place in broader paradigms, the lives and views of historians, and problems facing history writing in African universities today. A series of case studies (sources; forerunners; rural/urban societies; gender; resistance/accommodation; environment; religion; colonial rule; prisons/psychiatry; African intellectuals; biography) examine important historiographical issues from the past and present with a view to understanding the current state-of-the-art of African historiography, how it has changed over time and place, and likely future trends.

* (up to 7 at \$1,000 each)

Recognizes distinguished, well-rounded undergraduate achievement in academic work and career preparation. Must be junior majors in the College of Social Science.

Ernest G. and Phyllis C. Green MSU Black Alumni Scholarships

* (up to 2 at \$1,000 each)

Benefits talented students who will enhance program diversity and reinforce the record of commitment by the College of Social Science for educating students who are representative of our larger society. Must be freshmen, sophomore, or junior with a primary major in the College of Social Science.

Charles Hayden Kelly Scholarships

* (up to 2 at \$1,000 each)

Benefits worthy and capable students in the College of Social Science who have unusual financial need but may not normally be qualified for financial aid. Preference is given to students from single parent households who, without this award, would have difficulty attending MSU. Must be freshmen, sophomore, or junior majors in the College of Social Science.

Social Science Alumni Study Abroad Scholarships

Benefits students participating in study abroad programs. Recipients shall be selected based upon academic achievement, extracurricular activities, and financial need. Preference will be given to students wishing to study in Africa, China, India, or other Southeast Asian regions.

M. Peter McPherson Study Abroad Fund

* (number and amount awarded varies)

Benefits economically-disadvantaged students with legitimate financial needs, to include students who may not otherwise qualify for financial aid but nevertheless need assistance to afford participation in Study Abroad fieldwork. Encourages recipients to participate in a more challenging Study Abroad experience they might not otherwise be able to afford.

Foreign Language And Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships Announcement

Fellowships for graduate studies are expected to be available at Michigan State University through a grant under Title VI of the Higher Education Act from the U.S. Department of Education.

The FLAS Fellowship program is designed to meet critical needs for specialists in American education, government, and other services of a public and/or professional nature who will utilize their skills in training others and in developing throughout the United States a wider knowledge and understanding of other countries and cultures.

Fellowship support includes the payment of tuition and fees (up to \$12,000 per academic year) and a stipend of \$15,000 for the academic year. To be considered for fellowship support, you must be a citizen or national of the United States; or a permanent resident of the United States; or a permanent resident of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. You also must have earned a baccalaureate or comparable degree before the fellowship period begins and be admitted to or currently enrolled in a graduate degree program at Michigan State University.

The 2009-2010 Fulbright Faculty/Professional Scholars Fellowship Program and the 2009-2010 U.S. Student Fellowship Program will open, respectively, on March 1 and May 1, 2008. These programs provide outstanding opportunities for MSU faculty, graduate students and graduating seniors to develop international scholarly experience that can enhance their careers and enrich their lives. Grants are available for over 140 countries. They pay for air travel, a monthly living stipend, health and accident insurance, and, in some cases, tuition waivers and research allowances.

MSU-Compton Africa Peace Fellowships

The MSU-Compton Africa Peace Fellowships provide \$15,000 for dissertation research in Africa by exceptional MSU Ph.D. candidates who are citizens of a Sub-Saharan African country and who intend to return to their country or region of origin after completing their studies and whose topic concerns conflict resolution, peace, and security issues in Africa. Funds require a minimum of six months of research in Africa. Recipients must have completed all Ph.D. requirements except the dissertation before accessing the funds. Pre-Doctoral Fellow in African-New World Studies

African-New World Studies Program at Florida International University seeks a Pre-Doctoral Fellow for the Academic year 2008-2009. Applicants must have finished their course work and already begun dissertation writing. They must be conducting or have conducted research on Africa or/and the African Diaspora. The successful applicant will come from either the social sciences or the humanities. S/he will be expected to teach the undergraduate course "Introduction to African Worlds" during one semester and one other course related to the candidate's expertise during the second semester. The pre-doctoral fellow is also expected to support the academic and outreach activities of the program. Salary will be determined according to accomplishments and experience. Field Methods in Bolivia (for Ph.d. students)

Training among the Tsimane', a native Amazonian society of farmers and foragers in Bolivia focuses on methods to collect ecological, demographic, economic, cognitive, anthropometric, and health data. The training builds on and is informed by a panel study in progress since 1999, and lasts five weeks.

Dates: June 8 - July 13

Research Design (for Ph.d. students)

The three-week course focuses on research design and the writing of a scientifically well-conceived research proposal, and also provides an introduction to methods for collecting and analyzing both qualitative and quantitative

data.

Dates: July 13 - August 1

Short Courses on Research Methods (for holders of the Ph.d.)

Now in its fourth year, the SCRM program, offers intensive, five-day courses on research methods in cultural anthropology. The courses offered in 2008 include Text Analysis, Social Network Analysis, and Collecting and Analyzing Video Data.
