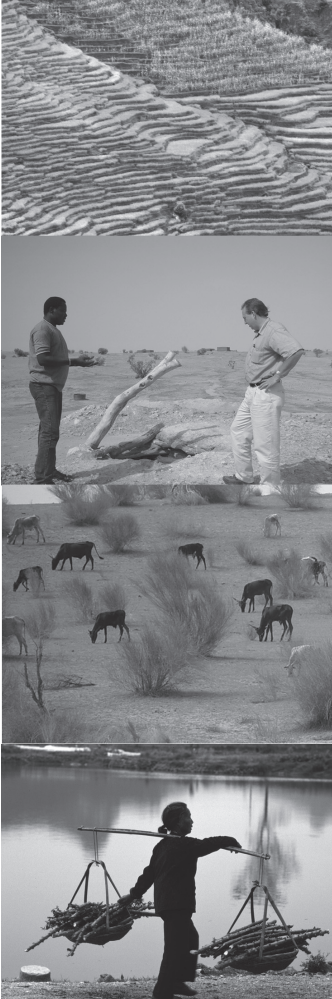

FALL 2008 COURSE ANNOUNCEMENTS

International Development: Theory and Practice (ACR 826)

RD 826, International Development and Sustainability, will become ACR 826, International Development: Theory and Practice in Fall 2008. The course addresses the evolution of international development theory across the disciplines; changing conceptualizations, measurements, processes and effects of development and poverty; and roles of ethnicity, social class, gender, and community as factors influencing socio-economic change processes. Current issues, concerns, and strategic alternatives will be discussed and related to actual cases. Cross-listed with anthropology, forestry, and political science, ACR 826 is required for CASID's graduate specialization in international development. Co-taught by Dr. Bill Derman (Anthropology) and Dr. John Kerr (CARRS), this three credit hour course will take place on Tuesdays from 3:00pm - 5:50pm, Rm 223 Natural Resources. Dr. John Kerr (jkerr@msu.edu) will be on sabbatical during Fall 2008, but is currently available to answer questions.

Contemporary Issues in the Anthropology of the Middle East (ANP 491)

Professor: Michael Perez

Tue and Thu, 10:20am - 11:40am, C002 Wilson Hall

This course examines some of the key issues surrounding the Middle East today through the lens of anthropology. Using contemporary ethnographic accounts of the people and politics of the region, this course will focus on the question of identity and community formation. Particular attention will be placed on the relationship between Islam and emergent political identities and movements throughout the region (Hamas, Hezbollah and The Muslim Brotherhood). The course will also examine contemporary issues surrounding the intersection of religion and gender and the status of minority communities within the Arab world. This course aims to widen students' perspectives and comprehension on the people and trends of the Middle East through the unique approach of anthropology.

The Global Urban Studies Program

This program will increase knowledge about processes, policies and issues in urban areas across the world, emphasizing global processes that impact and unite urban areas. The program endeavors to improve urban conditions through rigorous graduate education and innovative interdisciplinary research. Administered by the College of Social Science, the program offers interdisciplinary doctoral-level study integrated with programs offered by disciplinary departments and is available as an elective to students who are enrolled in doctoral degree programs at Michigan State

University. The Graduate Specialization in Global Urban Studies addresses political, spatial, cultural and economic processes and issues in urban areas across the United States and the world, as well as the global processes that impact and unite urban areas. Course work includes foci on urban areas in the United States and abroad; urban areas in comparative context regionally, nationally and internationally and how the forces of globalization change urban areas. With the approval of the department and college that administers the student's degree program, the courses that are used to satisfy the specialization may also be used to satisfy the requirements for the doctoral degree. FELLOWSHIPS AND GRANTS

Funding for Programs that Target Prevention of and Response to Gender-Based Violence (GBV)

Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration

Deadline: Wednesday April 30 at 6:00pm (EDT)

The Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration (PRM) has primary responsibility within the U.S. Government for administering assistance to refugees and conflict victims, and takes a leading role in formulating U.S. foreign policy on population and migration issues. One of PRM's key priorities is the protection of refugees, returnees and other conflict-affected populations overseas, particularly women and children from gender-based violence (GBV). PRM is currently seeking partners to support overseas assistance programs that will address GBV, including sexual abuse and exploitation (SEA) amongst refugees and refugee returnees.

GBV activities should be focused on any or all of the following (in no particular order):

- * To respond to current, identified needs in the field through a multi-sector approach.
- * To support measures to prevent GBV, including sexual abuse and exploitation (SEA).
- * To support measures to raise awareness as a means of effectively protecting victims of GBV.
- * To create local capacity to respond to GBV in a competent and timely manner.

PRM will accept proposals from any organization that is able to satisfy the requirements of this funding announcement:

- * A proven track record in providing assistance in dealing with prevention and response to GBV and an established

presence in the countries for which they are submitting proposals;

* Appropriate targeting of beneficiaries in coordination with UNHCR and other relevant organizations, as well as the relevant government(s);

* A working relationship with UNHCR and 2008 UNHCR funding and/or support for the proposed activities and/or overall country program; and

* Evidence of coordination with development organizations, when applicable, and a well-developed transition strategy.

The College Fund for International Travel (Faculty)

Friday, May 9, 2008 is the deadline for applications for Cycle I of the College Fund for International Travel for travel abroad to conferences (events) to present the results of your research or creative activity between July 1, 2008 and December 31, 2008. Grants awarded for the dissemination of the results of faculty research, most typically at significant professional events abroad: papers at professional conferences; exhibitions at galleries, museums, or shows; performances at music or theatrical venues. In addition to the form a complete application contains a two page curriculum vitae, a budget of expenditures and costs, and a two page narrative that clearly addresses each of the

following:

* Description of the paper, performance, or exhibit for which you are requesting funds

* The significance of your paper, performance, or exhibit as a contribution to your field,

* The relative importance of the conference/event and any relevant conference/event URL

* how your contribution represents a progression in your own scholarly/creative development or represents a new direction, and

* How participating in this particular conference/event in your field is significant to your scholarly reputation.

Special Foreign Travel Fund (SFTF)
