## FOREIGN LANGUAGE AND AREA STUDIES (FLAS) FELLOWSHIPS ANNOUNCEMENT

Fellowships for graduate studies are expected to be available at Michigan State University through a grant under Title VI of the Higher Education Act from the U.S. Department of Education.

The FLAS Fellowship program is designed to meet critical needs for specialists in American education, government, and other services of a public and/or professional nature who will utilize their skills in training others and in developing throughout the United States a wider knowledge and understanding of other countries and cultures.

Fellowship support includes the payment of tuition and fees (up to \$12,000 per academic year) and a stipend of \$15,000 for the academic year. To be considered for fellowship support, you must be a citizen or national of the United States; or a permanent resident of the United States; or a permanent resident of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. You also must have earned a baccalaureate or comparable degree before the fellowship period begins and be admitted to or currently enrolled in a graduate degree program at Michigan State University.

## 2008 TINKER FIELD RESEARCH GRANTS FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS

CLACS is pleased to announce the Tinker Field Grant competition to support pre-dissertation travel by both U.S. and international graduate students to Latin America. Latin America, as defined by the Tinker Foundation, includes all countries speaking Spanish and Portuguese in the region and the Caribbean. The Tinker Foundation will not allow funding for travel to Puerto Rico.

Tinker Foundation rules have changed slightly. We are now allowed to award up to 25% of the airline ticket price for maintenance and other costs. Funds cannot be used to support MSU study abroad programs or alternative spring/winter break activities. Under the current Tinker grant (2006-09) students can receive funding only once. Students who have been funded under other CLACS grants or by a Tinker awards form the previous (2002-2005) cycle are eligible to apply for this grant. After summer 2008, CLACS must sit out a year in the competition for Tinker grants, so CLACS will not be able to offer student research funds for summer 2009. For this reason, we urge you to apply during this cycle.

We would like to acknowledge the support of the MSU Graduate School and the Dean of International Studies and Programs to fund the additional resources required by the Tinker Foundation.

The Working Papers on Women and International Development series features article-length manuscripts by scholars from a broad range of disciplines. The series focuses on the relationships between gender and global transformation and publishes reports of empirical studies and projects, theoretical analyses, and policy discussions that illuminate the processes of change in the broadest sense.

Please consider submitting a manuscript for a special WID Working Papers edition on Sexual Violence and Conflict. In this special issue, the WID Working Papers is looking for submissions that advance knowledge on the complexity of sexual violence during violent conflict and post-conflict situations. We are interested in essays that examine various types of sexual violence, and its impacts on intersections on gender, race, ethnicity, class, and sexual orientation within different conflicts and domains.

This compilation of papers will synthesize a broad range of ideas and perspectives from multiple academic and geographic fields. We seek submissions for a special edition that will broaden our understanding of the history, practice, and effects of sexual violence directed towards women and/or men during and after conflict situations.

Papers from any geographic area of the developing world are welcome. Possible topics include but are not limited to:

- institutions of sexual violence such as sexual slavery, human trafficking and prostitution
- histories of sexual violence in conflicts around the globe, from the ancient world to the present
- international law and sexual violence
- innovative prevention, intervention and/or treatment of sexual violence
- networking or collaborative efforts
- medical, psychological, and clinical perspectives on sexual violence during war
- survivorhood and the healing process

ANP 439 "**Anthropology and Human Rights**," Tuesday, 4:00 pm - 6:50 pm, Instructor: Natalie J. Bourdon, email: [bourdonn@msu.edu](mailto:bourdonn@msu.edu)

Course Description:

The tensions between local cultural autonomy and universal rights are being expressed vociferously as the effects of globalization are felt in the farthest reaches of the globe. Anthropologists have long shaped debates on competing notions of cultural relativism and the idea of a universal human experience. This course will examine theoretical foundations for and ethnographies of human rights. We will begin the course by examining anthropology's contributions to contemporary theoretical, methodological and ethical approaches to and understanding of human rights. In turn, we will look to ethnographic accounts of the intersections between international human rights and local cultural practices to gain a more concrete understanding of human rights in practice. Students will be asked to relate human rights to different situations and address such questions as the nature of humanity, the limits of relativism and the relationship between human rights theory and practice. Lectures, readings, films and videos will be used as bases for study and for generating lively class discussions.
