

## FELLOWSHIPS AND GRANTS

### The Graduate School at MSU Dissertation Completion Fellowships

Twenty fellowships are available annually to allow students to devote full time to writing the dissertation with the goal that the dissertation will be completed during the tenure of the fellowship. Other MSU financial support, held simultaneously with the fellowship, cannot exceed a one-half time assistantship or the equivalent. Selection of fellowship winners will be made by a student's college. The colleges will set the conditions and application procedures for the Graduate School Dissertation Fellowships and will notify the Graduate School of the winners. The Fellowship awards will be dispensed by the Graduate School. Students should contact the associate dean's office of their college to find

### 2009-2010 Fulbright Fellowship Applications

Fulbright fellowship applications are now available for the 2009/2010 academic year. Faculty are encouraged to recommend exceptional students to submit application for Fulbright Fellowships in two categories to study, teach, and/or conduct research abroad in over 140 countries.

1. Students graduating in May, 2009 may apply for a Fulbright Institute for International Education (IIE) research or research and teaching grants.

2. Students who have been admitted to the doctoral program may apply for Fulbright IIE grants and/or Fulbright-Hayes Doctoral Dissertation Research Abroad (DDRA) grants.

The MSU submission deadline is September 25, 2008. Because letters of recommendation as well as letters of affiliation are required from cooperating institutions in the overseas host country, the earlier the process is begun, the better the chances of success.

### Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellowships

Launched in 1967, the International Affairs Fellowship Program is designed to advance the professional development of outstanding young Americans between the ages of 27 and 35. Each year, approximately ten men and women receive the opportunity to broaden their experience in the field of international affairs through this unique program. The fellowships seek to bridge the gap between thought and action in foreign policy by supporting both a variety of policy studies and active exposure to policymaking. The distinctive character of the program lies in the contrasting experiences it provides at the juncture of policy research and policy formulation. Thus, it encourages academics and others from the private sector to serve in a policy-oriented environment through operational experience in public service. ANNOUNCEMENTS *continued***The Tinker Foundation Field Research Grants**

The competition was initiated in 1979 within the Foundation's institutional grants program. These awards are available to recognized Centers or Institutes of Ibero-American or Latin American Studies with graduate doctoral programs at accredited United States universities. The Grants provide graduate students with travel funds (international and in-country) to Latin America, Spain and Portugal and limited field research expenses. These awards allow students to acquire a comprehensive knowledge of language and culture, to familiarize themselves with information sources relevant to their studies; to conduct pilot studies and preliminary investigations, and to develop contacts with scholars and institutions in their fields. They are awarded by the university institutes/centers for brief periods of research in Iberia or Latin America and should reflect primarily the Foundation's broad areas of interest. **The United States Institute of Peace Annual Grant Competition**

This Grant Supports innovative peacebuilding projects involving research, the identification of promising models and effective practices, the development of practitioner resources and tools, the development and delivery of education and training programs, and the production of films, radio programs and other media. USIP normally receives between 200 and 300 proposals annually and gives awards on average to 15 percent of the applicant pool. The awards generally range from \$40,000 to \$120,000. Call for Papers, accepted until September 15, 2008  
SCOUT BANANA, in conjunction with Michigan State University's African Studies Center and Office of International Development, invites undergraduates to submit a manuscript to Articulate: Undergraduate Scholarship Applied to International Development. Articulate is a new undergraduate scholarly journal that publishes academic papers and writings (research papers, field work, interviews, etc.) on issues in international development, focusing primarily on African studies and healthcare issues. Articulate is peer-reviewed by an editorial committee consisting of undergraduate students. Editorial decisions are based on relevance, quality, and originality.

Submissions should be roughly 10-15 pages long and formatted in the Chicago Manual of Style. In addition, the author's name, major, college, and university must appear on a separate cover sheet, with no reference to the author within the manuscript. Potential topics, include, but are not limited to: a) The effectiveness of foreign aid; b) Intersections of gender, ethnicity, and sexuality in African development; c) Comparative studies of healthcare systems; d) Ethics and development in African countries; e) Land rights reform/redistribution as a development policy; f) Historical analyses of development programs in Africa; g) Politics of water in Africa; h) The role of African youth in development programs and projects; i) Effects of conflict and forced migration on healthcare and development.
