2011-2012 FULBRIGHT FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The MSU Office of International Studies and Programs cordially invites faculty, graduate students and students graduating in 2011 to attend a Fulbright Scholarship Program Informational Workshop according to the following schedule:

MSU STUDENTS GRADUATING IN 2011 WORKSHOP on Thursday, April 1, 2010, Room 303 International Center from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.

MSU GRADUATE STUDENTS' WORKSHOP on Monday, April 5, 2010, room 303 International Center from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.

MSU FACULTY AND PROFESSIONALS SCHOLARS' WORKSHOP on Tuesday, April 6, 2010, Room 303-305 International Center from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

In these workshops participants will be informed about the objectives, requirements, and deadlines for each program as well as how to: 1) develop a more competitive application, 2) select a host country, 3) make necessary host country contacts, and 4) solicit winning letters of recommendation. Applicants must be U.S. Citizens.

Fulbright fellowships are prestigious, career-enhancing awards that confer special status on winners during and following their foreign study. They become outstanding, officially recognized representatives of the United States. Grants are provided to students, faculty, and professionals who undertake graduate study, advanced research, or teaching at the elementary, secondary, or university level in more than 140 countries. Most grantees choose their own programs. Projects may include university course work, independent library or field research, classes in an academic institution, a music conservatory, art school, or on special projects in the social or life sciences. The grants pay for air travel, a monthly living stipend, health and accident insurance and in some cases for tuition waivers and/or a research allowance.

STUDENT GROUP INITIATIVE

This May, 15 students from MSU and 2 from Davenport University will travel to India, participating in an MSU study abroad program, "International Development and Markets in India." Students will learn about rural development while taking courses in agriculture and Indian history and culture. Part of the program involves completing a practicum in Integrated Human Development at Shanti Ashram, a local nonprofit organization focusing on rural development and community health in Coimbatore, India.

This is the third year for the program, and previous participants have maintained a connection to Shanti Ashram after witnessing firsthand the impact made by the organization. In fall 2009, Students Advancing International Development (SAID) was formed. SAID is continually searching for ways to assist Shanti in fulfillment of its mission. Shanti Ashram has experience in organizing immunization clinics (i.e., 5,000 children have been immunized over the past two years for typhoid and Hepatitis B). SAID approached Shanti with the idea of raising money to provide measles/mumps/ rubella (MMR) vaccinations. SAID has a goal of raising \$16,000 by the end of spring semester 2010; at the cost of approximately \$2 per vaccination, \$16,000 will allow for the immunization of 8,000 children in India against MMR during the summer program.

With financial support from Paramount Coffee, SAID has been selling coffee as a fundraiser, thus far raising over \$10,000 in donations and pledges. The group is selling bags of Fair Trade Certified Rwandan Coffee from Paramount. Selling Fair Trade coffee ensures a double benefit: coffee farmers in Rwanda are paid fair wages for their work, while Paramount donates \$5 dollars for every \$10 bag of coffee sold toward the MMR vaccinations.
