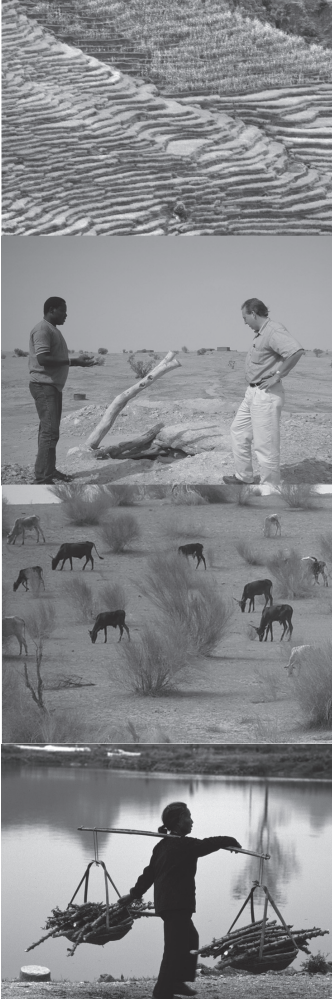

## CENTER FOR ADVANCED STUDY OF INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND WOMEN AND INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM INVITE APPLICATIONS FOR THE:

### 2007-2008 ACADEMIC YEAR FELLOWSHIPS and 2007 SUMMER INTENSIVE LANGUAGE FELLOWSHIPS under the FOREIGN LANGUAGE AND AREA STUDIES FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

The Center for Advanced Study of International Development (CASID) and Women and International Development Program (WID) at Michigan State University awards graduate fellowships under the Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowship program of the U.S. Department of Education (US/ED). The FLAS Fellowship program is designed to meet critical needs for specialists in American education, government, and other services of a public and/or professional nature who will utilize their skills in training others and in developing throughout the United States a wider knowledge and understanding of other countries and cultures. CASID/WID's FLAS Fellowships are awarded to graduate students enrolled in programs which combine the study of a modern foreign language with advanced training and research in international development studies. Per US/ED guidelines, priority will be given to students who apply to study less commonly taught languages. Questions regarding language eligibility should be directed to Dr. Robert Glew (517) -353-4818. Fellowship support includes the payment of tuition and fees (up to \$12,000 per academic year) and a stipend of \$15,000 for the academic year. To be considered for fellowship support, an applicant must:

1. Be a citizen or national of the United States; or a permanent resident of the United States; or a permanent resident of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.
2. Have earned a baccalaureate or comparable degree before the fellowship period begins and be admitted to or currently enrolled in a graduate degree program at Michigan State University.
3. Intend to complete an advanced graduate program (disciplinary, interdisciplinary, or professional; Ph.D. or Master's) at Michigan State University with a concentration on international development/globalization/gender.
4. Show potential for high academic achievement, as evidenced by such indices as grade point average or other measures.

Applicants must agree to pursue full-time graduate study and propose a course of study that includes both language training and international development course work.

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### DISSERTATION FELLOWSHIPS IN POPULATION, REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH, AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Population Reference Bureau (PRB) is now accepting applications for the Dissertation Fellowship in Population, Reproductive Health, and Economic Development. The two-year fellowships of \$20,000 per year will be awarded by The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation and PRB. The fellowships are open to students currently enrolled in Ph.D. programs in the United States and Canada. Students in economics, economic demography, geography, and epidemiology are especially encouraged to apply. Please distribute this announcement to Ph.D. advisors, colleagues, and students that may be interested in applying. These fellowships will support dissertation research on topics that examine how population dynamics and family planning and reproductive health (FP/RH) influence economic development, including economic growth, poverty reduction, and equity. Dissertations that address population and development issues pertinent to the African continent are especially encouraged. The research must include a strong quantitative component, with an emphasis on rigorous data analysis. We encourage the development or use of new statistical methods. Finally, the research must have a strong policy-relevant component, demonstrating an interest in communicating research results with program managers, planners, and policymakers. **IREX FELLOWSHIP - 2007-2008 US EMBASSY  
POLICY SPECIALIST (EPS) PROGRAM**

IREX is pleased to announce the 2007-2008 competition of the US Embassy Policy Specialist (EPS) Program.

The US Embassy Policy Specialist Program will allow fellows to travel to Eurasia and serve the embassy as policy specialists on a chosen topic and also pursue their own research project independently. Fellowships are available to successful applicants who demonstrate how their experience, skills, and knowledge will benefit US embassy personnel, as well as the academic merit and feasibility of their proposed research. Fellows will serve the embassy and conduct their own research for approximately one month. Fellowship length and dates will be decided upon in consultation with the specific embassy. Examples of embassy service can include conducting field research, writing policy papers, consulting embassy staff, and assisting with grant panels.

Depending on the needs of the individual embassy, fellows may spend all or part of the time on-site at the embassy or work from a remote location in country. The EPS Program provides fellowships for up to eight weeks to US postdoctoral scholars and other graduate degree holders for independent or collaborative research projects in Europe and Eurasia.

Yerevan, Armenia: Ethnic/Cultural Studies, Conflict Resolution, or Corruption & Public Integrity

Chisinau, Moldova: Conflict Resolution

Ashgabat, Turkmenistan: Environment and Agriculture

Baku, Azerbaijan: Religion, Conflict Resolution, or Ethnic/Cultural Studies

Dushanbe, Tajikistan: Economics/Statistics, Conservation, or Religion
