## Call for Absracts for the African Graduate Students Association First Annual Research Conference

The African Graduate Students Association (AGSA) is calling for abstracts from all African MSU students and Africanists from different disciplines who are conducting research in Africa with a focus on the following sub themes: education, health, food security, agriculture, environmental issues, leadership and governance, and information and communication technology. Research is fundamental to the development process of Africa. It plays a key role in informing development interventions in every sector. Yet, the relationship between researchers and decision makers is not without tension and has been a subject of considerable debate, with a focus on how research can better influence policy makers and how policy makers can use good research to inform development interventions. The AGSA realizes the real potential of research to promote the emergence of new ideas and skills, and for their dissemination to inform formulation of effective policies for development. It is in this light that this first ever AGSA Annual Research Conference seeks to provide a platform for creating new ideas to the larger thematic orientation and promote proactive dialogue among researchers, decision makers and civil society stakeholders. The main purpose is to share ideas arising from research conducted by graduate students working on African issues and deliberate on ways to create and strengthen networks among researchers, decision makers and civil society. Ultimately, such interaction can improve the intellectual framework surrounding decision-making, especially in the policy arena.

Abstracts are invited from completed research or research in progress. As this will be a multidisciplinary conference, presenters are urged to put emphasis on the significance and impact of their research in their respective study areas and addressing the problem(s) of focus. Abstracts should be a maximum of 250 words and should include the broader problem in which the research is situated. The presenter's nationality, the country in which the research is conducted, the department at MSU and name of the academic supervisor should be indicated on the abstracts. Accepted submissions will be allotted oral or poster presentation, both of which are equally significant. Email abstracts to: <a href="mailto:agsa@msu.edu">agsa@msu.edu</a>. All submitted abstracts will be subjected to a blind peer review process and authors will be notified of abstract acceptance by March 2, 2016.

The Center for Advanced Study of International Development (CASID) and the Center for Gender in Global Context (GenCen) at Michigan State University award undergraduate and graduate fellowships under the Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships Program of the U.S. Department of Education (US/ED) to students enrolled in a program that combines the study of a modern foreign language with advanced training in international development studies or in the international development aspects of professional or other fields of study. The FLAS Fellowship Program is designed to meet critical needs for specialists in American education, government, and other services of a public and/or professional nature who will utilize their skills: a) in training others; and b) in developing throughout the United States a wider knowledge and understanding of other countries and cultures.

CASID and GenCen welcome qualified undergraduate and graduate students who are currently studying at MSU or who have applied for study beginning fall 2015 to apply for these awards. FLAS Fellowship funds are available to support students interested in issues related (but not limited) to the following thematic foci: global food; agriculture; the environment; livelihood strategies; economics; governance; education; health disparities; violence, conflict, and conflict resolution; and identities and representations. Undergraduate awards are worth up to \$15,000 per academic year. Graduate awards are worth up to \$33,000 per academic year. Summer awards are worth up to \$7,500.
