"Documenting Nepantla: Decolonial Knowledge and Chicana Subjectivity in the Films of Lourdes Portill"

Presentation by Dr. Nohemy Solórzano-Thompson, Associate Professor of Spanish, Whitman College. Nohemy teaches courses on theater, film, performance, and language. Her research focuses on gender and sexuality in Mexican and Chicana/o popular culture. Her publications include articles on contemporary Mexican film and US Latino/a performance; and a forthcoming book (Mc-Farland Publishers 2012) on the representation of Mexican indigenous women that draws on Chicana feminist theory to argue that a colonial gaze erases indigenous women's agency and polices their sexuality while ironically exalting the mestizo identity of Mexicans. Solórzano-Thompson is Past-Chair of the National Association for Chicana and Chicana Studies (NACCS), Cochair for the Mexico Section of Latin American Studies Association (LASA), and is an active member of Asociación Internacional de Literatura y Cultura Femenina Hispánica (AILCFH) and Mujeres Activas en Letras y Cambio Social (MALCS).

This presentation is a part of this year's Fall Colloquium, "Media, Art and Activism in the Middle East and Asia."



Community-Based Natural Resource Management in Developing Countries

This course analyzes rural natural resource management in developing countries, focusing on the factors that lead to natural resource outcomes, e.g. conservation, productivity, and income distribution. The course begins with a look at how human and natural systems interact, then addresses a variety of issues that influence natural resource management including people's perceptions of the natural resource scarcity, poverty and population density, tenure security, property rights regimes, collective action and its determinants, and governance. It also examines policy approaches for promoting conservation where benefits are off-site. This course qualifies for the FLAS specializations and some other specializations on campus.

An Anthropological Introduction to Islam in Africa

This course is open to both undergraduate and graduate students and aims to provide an overview of "African" Islam through the work of Muslim and non-Muslim scholars from anthropology and other related disciplines. We will begin with an overview of the fundamentals of Islam before turning to the diverse accounts of the historical spread of Islam to Africa, the religious implications of the African slave trade and European colonialism, and Islamic philosophies, education, prayer, novels, law and politics in different African countries and contexts. Themes of religious conversion, gendered dynamics, migration, new media, and the relationship of Islam to human rights will also be explored. We will visit the Islamic Center of East Lansing, watch films, follow the media portrayal of Africa, and hear alternative narratives of Islam in Africa from guest speakers.
