Norway, with its 5 million population and 6 million P.E. wastewater treatment capacity, has somewhat peculiar practices: Over 70% of wastewater goes through a coagulation stage; some plants have treatment requirements of over 97% on phosphates; no private ownership; many plants are constricted underground/rocks; over 80% of sludge is used in agriculture etc. Norwegian plants also show that removing over 80% organic matter without biological treatment is possible. Norwegian practices thereby stand out from both continental European and Scandinavian practices. Welcome to a quick

journey through the evolution of Norwegian wastewater treatment.

Carcinogens in our Food: Global Impact in Comparison to Diet-Related Risks

Certain chemicals and naturally occurring toxins that contaminate our food supply have been shown to cause human cancer. Among them are aflatoxin (a fungal toxin, naturally occurring in corn and various nuts and spices), arsenic, and aristolochic acid. In this talk, I will discuss my work at the World Health Organization (WHO) to evaluate the global burden of disease caused by carcinogens in the human diet. I will compare these risks to the global burden of cancer caused by other diet-related risks, including processed and red meat, and diet-related obesity.

have mostly contrasted East Asia with the West. Professor Thomas Talhelm tested 1,162 Han Chinese participants in six sites and found that people in southern China are more interdependent and holistic-thinking than people in the north. I propose that rice farming's irrigation and high labor requirements gave southern China a tight, interdependent culture. In contrast, traditional wheat farming required less labor and less coordination, giving northern China a more free-wheeling independent culture. The fact that these differences exist among in this sample of China's youngest generation who have not farmed for a living suggest these agricultural legacies continue to affect people in the modern world.

Thomas Talhelm is an Assistant Professor of Behavioral Science at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business. Thomas has lived in China for five years as a Princeton in Asia fellow, as a freelance journalist in Beijing, and most recently a Fulbright scholar. He researches how rice farming gave southern China a very different culture from wheat-farming in northern China. Thomas also founded Smart Air, a social enterprise that makes low-cost DIY air purifiers to help people in China protect themselves against air pollution.


