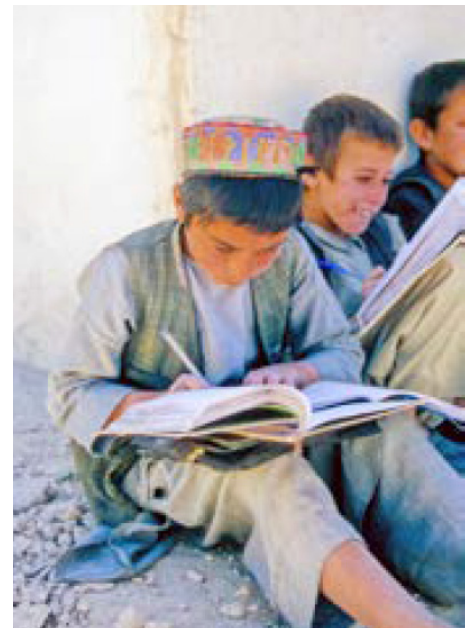
Dara Lind's lecture will address the following: Anti-immigration backlash is properly understood as a response not to broader economic or even demographic trends, but to events — and the media attention that ensues. It's powerful because it taps into anxiety that American values are being upended or disrespected by those coming in; it's hard to accommodate by a liberal political consensus, or by legislative deal-making, because it exposes the harsh truth that the things one values most about America aren't always compatible with the things that the newcomers value. The good news: there are some (perhaps unexpected) overlaps between the desires of liberal immigration reformers and the values

immigration skeptics are anxious to uphold, which means that — in theory — there’s some “low-hanging fruit” in terms of policy change. The bad news: it’s impossible to design a policy regime that totally prevents any possible backlash, and trying to neutralize the backlash is more likely to harm — than help — the people most dis-served by the status quo.

Event Details: The Sicilian folk hero Giufà is known throughout the Mediterranean: in Turkey he is known as Nasreddin Hoca; and in the Arab world as Juá. In all likelihood he was an expression of an oral tradition before he appeared in an Arabic book printed in the ninth century. Giufà was 'imported' to Sicily in the ninth century with the Arab conquest. He is a comedic character, a sort of 'village idiot,' who is not without his own redeeming qualities. Prof. Francese will discuss how Giufà entered the Italian literary tradition in the second-half of the nineteenth century and will provide a 'close reading' of the tales of the Giufà cycle.

Joseph Francese is University Outstanding Faculty and Professor of Italian in the Romance and Classi-

cal Studies section of the College of Arts and Letters at MSU. He is also Senior Editor of Italian Culture (the journal of the American Association for Italian Studies); Editor of "Studi di italianistica moderna e contemporanea nel mondo anglofono/Studies in Modern and Contemporary Italianistica in the Anglophonic World" (a monograph series published by Firenze University Press); and has served on the PMLA Advisory Committee.

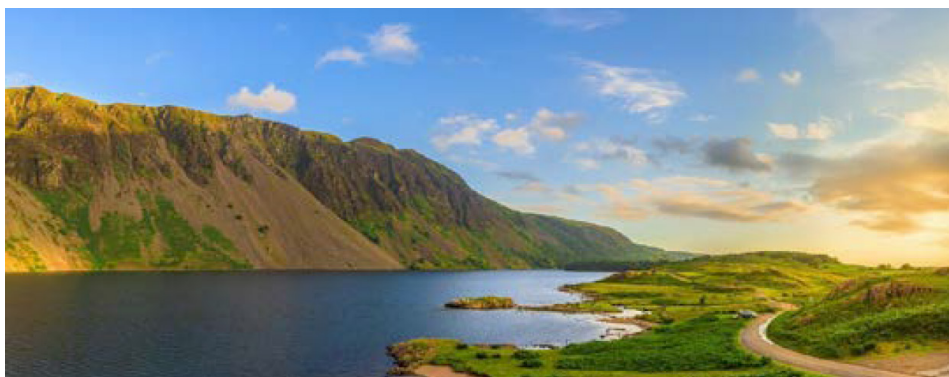

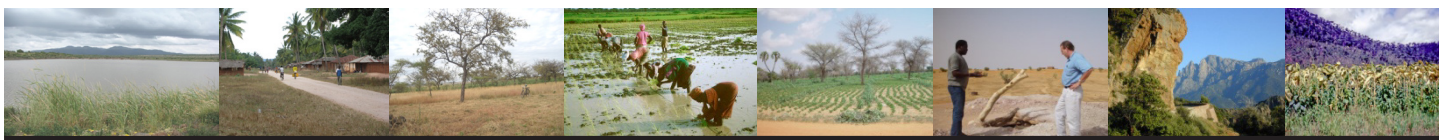

Not all citizens and residents—women, African Americans, Native Americans, and immigrants—participated fully in the American body politic.
